ORGANIZATIONAL NEWS




On December 4, our Board of Directors adopted a 2022 budget projecting we'll spend \$700,000 (in 2021 we spent approximately \$535,000). However, our Annual Appeal was so successful and we raised approximately \$1.3 million in 2021 so we should be able to spend even more on children this year!

In response to the devastating tornadoes in KY, our Board authorized spending \$25,000 for kids in the state. Sometime in January, our Executive Director will be traveling to Dawson Springs and other cities to distribute gift cards so kids could get some sense of "normalcy" in their lives by purchasing new clothes, furniture, and other items to replace the ones they lost.

As the number of requests continues to skyrocket, we have a need for more help. We currently have one full-time person (our ED) and three part-time people. In December, the Board authorized spending money on a Deputy Director who would take over a lot of the management responsibilities. To start, however, we have named Board member John Knemeyer as our NON-PAID Deputy Director to get a sense of how we would efficiently utilize this new position.
